October as Crime Prevention Month

In 1984, the National Crime Prevention Council (NCPC) designated October as Crime Prevention Month. Every year since then, government agencies, civic groups, and organizations have used this month to educate the public and provide resources to help communities address crime trends locally. October is the official month for recognizing the importance of crime prevention practices, and bringing awareness toward significant matters such as victimization, volunteerism, and community safety. In honor of Crime Prevention Month, we will be sharing new themes each week corresponding with the NCPC, each with relevant information and insight into pressing crime prevention issues. Now is the best time of year to discover new strategies, safety and prevention tips, and safety recommendations for your home, workplace, and community.

Week 4: Gang Prevention

As we near the end of Crime Prevention Month, we will discuss the importance and relevance of Gang Prevention. NCPC provides training and strategies aimed at reducing gang presence, promoting safe environments, and re-directing youth away from gang activity. Though some regions in the country are more affected by gang crime than others, it is more widespread of an issue than most people realize. Larger cities and suburban communities are the primary sites of gang activity, but smaller cities and rural communities can be affected as well. In 2012, there was an estimated 850,000 gang members a part of nearly 30,000 gangs across the country. They often share a common purpose, such as engaging in criminal or violent activities, drug dealing, property crime, and gun violence. There are factors that are likely to lead to gang involvement, including emotional disorders, school failure, low socioeconomic status, and early involvement in minor crimes. Youth in particular primarily join gangs for protection, respect, or money. It is necessary for communities and law enforcement agencies alike to work together to prevent gang violence and protect the communities affected by it.

The NCPC provides comprehensive resources with information regarding gang violence and prevention. They made <u>seven strategies</u> that integrate gang prevention education and positive alternatives to gangs:

- 1. Educate young people about the costs and consequences of gang involvement.
- 2. Keep youth in school and enrolled in positive activities when the school day ends.
- 3. Raise awareness among parents and students of the signs of gang activity.
- 4. Provide students with opportunities to practice refusal skills.
- 5. Make sure your school is designated drug-free zone and that your students are aware of this status.
- 6. Engage students in community service or service-learning projects.
- 7. Encourage youth who want to leave a gang to talk to an adult they trust.

Integrating these strategies along with other resources within a community can be helpful in preventing crime, helping affected individuals, and stopping the problem at the source. If gang violence is an issue in your area, consider working within your neighborhood and greater community, contacting local law enforcement agencies, and seeing how you can involve yourself

to better protect the place that you live. Workplace safety

- Secure your valuables by keeping your belongings close to you or locked in a drawer at all times.
- Be aware of your environment: report any doors that don't lock properly, broken windows, or any other hazard if you see it.
- Be discreet: don't advertise your social life or outside plans to people visiting/calling your place of work.

Social Safety

- Don't drink & drive: though it may seem like common sense, have a designated driver if you plan to drink.
- Call for help: If there is a threat or suspected threat of violence, call the police immediately—don't wait for someone else to make the call
- Always be aware of your surroundings: know where you are and who is around you. Remain alert. Stay with your group and never leave a social function alone.

Internet Safety

- Choose a strong password & protect it: do not use the same password for multiple sites. This leaves you at a high risk of your password being hacked across multiple sites. Change your password every few months and make sure it is not easy to guess.
- Review financial statements regularly: look over your credit card & bank statements every month. If you notice any unusual charges, immediately report them to your credit card company or bank.

According to the NCPC, the second week of National Crime Prevention Month focuses on safe firearms storage. Responsible firearms owners use their firearms safely and understand the need to prevent them from getting into the wrong hands. But even still, 1.4 million homes have firearms stored in a way that makes them most accessible to about 2.6 million children. According to Business Insider, criminals steal nearly 250,000 guns from legal American gun-owners every year, exemplifying the severity of the crime. The problem is exacerbated by legal gun-owners who fail to secure their firearms, making it easy for thieves to steal them. As gun theft increases across the country, violent crime increases as well. When guns get into the wrong hands, it can lead to tragedies on both a community-wide and national scale.

Firearm safety should be a priority in order to better protect our children, prevent avoidable injury, and keep our communities safe. There are a variety of different locking and storage solutions available to firearms owners. If you own a gun, consider the following to better protect your home from accidental misuse or theft:

Trigger lock: a trigger lock can be used to keep someone from being able to pull the trigger. They are available in a variety configurations, from basic key lock options to ones that require combinations to open.

Cable lock: These can be used on most firearms, commonly place through the gun barrel. The locks generally impede loading and firing of the gun.

Storage case: The cases come in various sizes and styles, and can be used for both storing and locking of a firearm. The case can be locked, but often the lock must be purchased separately.

Lock box: a lock box is similar to a small safe that allows you to safely store your firearm via a key or combination lock by a digital keypad. This prevents unauthorized access.

Just last year, there were over 1,500 data breaches, which altogether left 179 million records vulnerable to fraud. Once identity thieves have access to your information, they can drain your bank account, run up charges on your credit cards, open new utility accounts, or receive medical treatment on your health insurance. How to Prevent Identity Theft

- Secure your Social Security Number. Don't carry it in your wallet or give it out, unless absolutely necessary
- Enable the security features on your mobile devices
- Pay attention to your billing cycles. If bills or financial statements are late, contact the sender

- Store personal information in a safe place
- Shred receipts, credit offers, account statements, and expired credit cards
- Review your credit report once a year to be certain that it doesn't include accounts that you have not opened

Warning Signs of Identity Theft

- You don't get your bills or other mail when you usually do.
- There are withdrawals from your bank account that look unfamiliar
- You find unfamiliar accounts or charges on your credit report
- You receive a bill for a service you didn't use
- You get notice that your information was compromised by a data breach at a company where you have an account
